Well, well, well. 2025 was quite the decade, wasn't it?

In the span of one year, we entered an entirely new and entirely horrifying political reality. Our wildlife, waters, and wildlands are under direct and relentless attack. The environmental laws foundational to our work are being dismantled. Natural resources agencies have been eviscerated. The public's voice is being shut out of decision-making. And groups like Oregon Wild are being threatened and targeted for doing

the very work for which we were founded.

It's a LOT. And that's just the news from the frontlines of Trump's war against nature in Oregon.

Shall we all take a moment to engage in some primal screaming?

OK. That helped. A little.

The other thing that helps is taking action – working day after day in ways both big and small to speak out for Oregon's wild places and wild things.

Even more inspiring is doing this work together with you. In this last year, Oregon Wild has leaned on our community, and you all showed up in a big way.

Last year, we jumped into action to oppose the Trump Administration's plan to roll back the Roadless Rule. This rule protects some of the most special places in Oregon. Places like Lost Lake, Tumalo Mountain and the dunes. In just three weeks, more than 600,000 people across the country spoke out. And the results were astonishing. Ninety nine percent of all comments submitted were strongly opposed to rescinding the Roadless Rule and in favor of keeping its protections in place.

Thousands of Oregonians spoke out to defend the Northwest Forest Plan and Blue Mountains Forest Plan, to oppose bad federal legislation like the Fix Our Forests Act, and to advocate for 1% for Wildlife in the state legislature. You called your legislators, wrote comments, submitted testimony, drafted letters to the editor, marched in rallies, attended town halls, and more. And you continued your generous and essential support of Oregon Wild, for which we are infinitely grateful.

We are unstoppable when we stand together, which is why we reignited our Wild Ones activist training program with a calendar of incredible skill-building workshops and opportunities to connect. We also launched our inaugural Rabble Rouser event – a one-day training in joyful resistance and collective action – and we're already planning for year two (mark your calendars for August 23rd).

The threats to our public lands, old-growth forests, free-flowing rivers and native wildlife will continue. In 2026, we've already seen a new attack on western Oregon forests. But we've learned and adapted. With your support, we've gotten better and stronger. And holy hell, we are fired up.

We are, as always, grateful to be in it with you. If you need a jumpstart for how to engage as we barrel toward the mid-terms, check out our Resistance Bingo card and start checking things off. It will help you feel better. We promise.

acres on the Mount Hood National Forest were threatened by the Grasshopper logging project. With your support, Oregon Wild and our partners reached a legal settlement in January 2025 to significantly improve this project and halt the logging of mature and old-growth trees.

99%

of the 600,000+ public comments the Forest Service received support maintaining the Roadless Rule protections that safeguard over two million acres of Oregon's wildlands, including Lost Lake, Tumalo Mountain, and the headwaters of the McKenzie River.

300+

native wildlife species will be able to stave off extinction thanks to our 1% for Wildlife proposal. 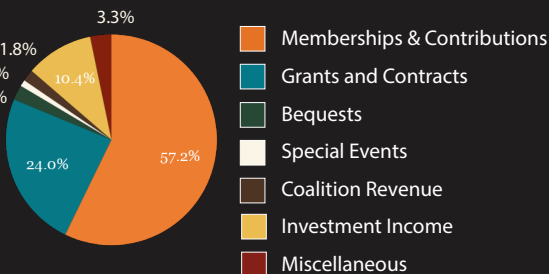

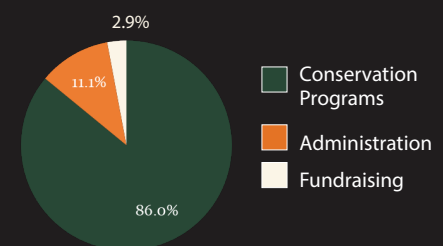
